instruments of power. He laments the increase of careerism and opportunism among academics, claiming that intellectual life has grown divorced from reality and justice².

The conversation also delves into **identity politics and "woke" culture**, which Finkelstein views as weapons used by liberal elites to distract from class inequalities and defend the privileged. He highlights the hypocrisy of institutions that claim to condemn racism while remaining mute about the tragedy in Gaza. This ties to a broader theme of Western hypocrisy, as human rights language is applied selectively, often ignoring or rationalizing Israel's conduct².

On the Israel-Palestine conflict, Finkelstein contends that Israel's policy is to **make Gaza unlivable rather than pursue peace**, and he thinks that a diplomatic settlement is conceivable while US domination endures. The discussion includes global power shifts, the symbolic significance of Jerusalem, and the potential of military escalation culminating to nuclear conflict².

Finally, the interview is a call to moral integrity, truth, and solidarity with the disadvantaged. It portrays Finkelstein as a unique academic conscience someone who stands up for honesty and justice against political pressure and personal expense².
